PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Fellow Lions:

Spring is nearly upon us. How time flies! In less than two months, our club will be 50! Fifty is quite a milestone and we should celebrate it and look back on how we came to be. I spoke to a couple of charter members to learn a little about the very early days.

Who is presently 104 years old (it's not a typo!) and a Lion for almost 50 years? Most of you know the answer: Lion Richard Okamoto, charter

member. After discharge from the military in 1946, Lion Richard worked as the Director of the Contact Division of the US Veterans Administration. He was invited more than once to be a Lion, but he declined, until 1973 when there was talk of forming a Hawaii Kai Club. Lion Richard recalls there were dozens of charter members, with Lion Rick Yee being instrumental in forming the club. Lion Richard remembers that Lion Rick's father was a Lion. Lion Richard did not know anyone and, although he had not belonged to any other community organization, the Lions was the right fit for him. The club was committed to serving the community and he was able to balance service with work, family, and fun. He described the members as being a mixture of very good people. The Father's Day breakfast (even though he missed the very first one), and the building of bus stops ranked tops in his memory. The club did not have a club house for its meetings, so they met in various restaurants in East Honolulu. No doubt, these are fond memories!

This recollection comes from Lion Bunny Lee, another of our charter members. He is not certain who invited him to become a Lion, but it may have been Lion Rick Yee, whose father was the owner of Davenroy Drycleaners and a Lion club president. He remembers a group of 33 men (yes, only men back then) met at Kamiloiki Elementary School to form the Hawaii Kai Lions Club. The very first club meeting was held in a conference room of Pacific Savings & Loan at the Koko Marina Center. As the club did not have a fixed meeting place, it met at various restaurants in East Hawaii but also places like the Hawaii Kai Library and even at a yacht club. Sometime after the Lions did a clean-up project for Lunalilo Home, the Hawaii Kai Lions were allowed to use Lunalilo Home's facilities as its clubhouse. Alas, in 1997 or thereabouts, Lunalilo Home underwent extensive renovations, and the Lions temporarily lost its clubhouse. (History is repeating itself.) Lions again roamed Hawaii Kai for meeting places such as Koko Head Elementary School cafeteria and Kuapa Isle

Clubhouse. Once the renovations were completed, the Lions resumed meeting at Lunalilo Home. Lion Bunny recalled the first pancake breakfast was "hard work," but the ingredients for the breakfast were mostly donated so the profit was good, how an experiment of fundraising with Zippy's Chili did not go as well as the pancake breakfast, building bus stop shelters, rebuilding fire escape stairs at Lunalilo Home (those stairs may outlast the building!), and making concrete benches for Kaiser High School. His favorite memory is the fellowship among members and their families, many of whom had young children.

Kaiser High Concession Stand Project

On January 30 – February 2, 2023, six Hawaii Kai Lions, one CIS, two prospective Lions, and one prospective CIS refurbished the Kaiser High School concession stand. They worked from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. most of the days, with the last day until 12:45 p.m. The initial plan was to recondition the 18 cabinet doors on the left hand side of the stand and repainting those walls. In discussion with the Kaiser athletic director, it was decided to include the right hand side cabinets (8 more doors) and walls. And as the work progressed, it was agreed to add repairs to the front windows, repainting those windows and counter top, and constructing removable counter trays, so that the repainted counter tops would not get damaged.

Lions participating in this event included Jeanne Alices, Cynthia Chun, Prospective Lion Joni Fukuji, Prospective CIS Herb Fukuji, Yolisa Ishibashi, CIS Anthony Nakamura, Prospective Lion Kelvin Kaneoka, Walter Kuroiwa, and Ken Nishibun.

It was amazing that the work was completed withing four days, which included: sanding, priming, and painting all the cabinet doors; fixing the door catches and installing the door handles; making new cabinet doors (since the old ones were beyond repair); painting all the walls and the counter; making four counter trays, and cleaning the floors. Additional work will be done on the windows, as soon as the ordered parts are received, and a date scheduled for repair.

Thank you to those Lions and CIS who volunteered for this project and also to those prospective Lions and prospective CIS who were willing to jump in and help with paint brushes and tools in hand. The Kaiser High School athletic director, Nelson Chee, was very grateful for all of our hard work and appreciated our time and effort into this project.
